BACKGROUND

The approval of Agenda 2030 in September 2015 constitutes a unique opportunity for the world we live in. For the first time, all the member states of the United Nations committed to eradicating poverty, making the first universal plan of action for people, planet and prosperity.

Within the Agenda 2030, cities take a very special place as instruments for growth, equality and opportunity, as for the first time, an objective dedicated exclusively to cities was included in the Agenda. SDG 11 wants to “Make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable”.

Cities cannot be an opportunity for all in the absence of able, capable and accountable local governments. Local and regional governments all over the world are already committed to implement the SDGs at local level and their global networks have been very present in the design and first stages of implementation of the Agenda 2030.

This first edition of the Venice City Solutions wants to explore how to make SDGs a reality for all from the local level. The event wants to bring a multi-level contribution on existing solutions and challenges to finance the SDGs at local level.

OCDE recently published that 65% of the SDG targets are already in the hands of local and regional governments. Financing the localization of the SDGs will ensure to achieve already 65% of the Agenda 2030. According to UN agencies such the United Nations Capital Development Fund, investing at local level also produces one of the highest returns in investment and it touches the lives of people right away.

OBJECTIVES

The dialogue aims at bringing together representatives of central governments, local and regional government associations, Mayors, Governors and other governmental representatives and selected partners, including the private sector to identify existing experiences, gathering data and providing solutions to the challenge of how to finance the implementation of the SDGs at local level.

The outcome document will inform the seventh UN High-level Political Forum on Sustainable Development that will take place in year 2019 addressing the theme, 'Empowering people and ensuring inclusiveness and equality'. Next year, the HLPF will conduct an in-depth review of SDG 4 (quality education), SDG 8 (decent work and economic growth), SDG 10 (reduced inequalities), SDG 13 (climate action) and SDG 16 (peace, justice and strong institutions), in addition to SDG 17 (partnerships for the Goals) which is reviewed each year.

The Venice City Solutions event will contribute to the assessment of both SDG 16 and SDG 17th, as well as will be submitted for consideration to the Global Sustainable Development Report (GSDR), which is issued every four years.

Specific outputs of the Dialogue will include:

- **Accelerating** the implementation of SDGs at local level.
- Identifying **mechanism of financial support for local** and regional governments to achieve Agenda 2030.
- To **create awareness** about the need for local and regional governments to have the necessary financial resources to implement Agenda 2030.
- Assessment of **national legislation conducive** to the financing of the SDGs at local level.
- Identification of **existing practices** and initiatives, both at local and national level, about how different countries are making the SDGs a reality at local level, and for all.
- Elaboration about a very early set of **data collection** about municipal budgets dedicated to align to the SDGs at local level.
- To share the **national strategies** that the different member states are putting into place to finance the SDGs at local level.
- Establishment of **dialogue mechanisms** between central and local governments to achieve the SDGs at local level.
- **Map untapped financial instruments** or practices to finance SDG at local level

ORGANISERS

This event is organized within the context of the *Local2030: Localizing the SDGs* initiative. Local2030 is currently hosted by the Executive Office of the Secretary-General. Local2030 is a network that brings together governments at all levels, the private sector, academia and civil society with the UN system to support and accelerate the implementation of the SDGs at the local level.

This particular event is co-organised within the Joint programme "Enabling local and regional governments to achieve the SDGs" by UNDP, UN-Habitat and UNCDF in collaboration with United Cities and Local Governments.

The event is hosted by the [Italian Association for the Council of European Municipalities \(AICCRES\)](#) and financially supported by [Platforma](#) and [UNACLA](#).

The City Solutions Series wants to identify trends and innovation in local public management by linking the examples from specific territory with its contribution to achieve the global agendas, including the SDGs, the Paris Agreement, the Addis Ababa Action Agenda and the New Urban Agenda. The proposal is this will be the first edition of the Venice City Solutions, with possible editions in the subsequent years, concentrating in each occasion in one theme of relevance for the local implementation of the SDGs.

A technical visit to the City of Venice is also included in the programme on Saturday 17th November for participants wishing to stay. The visit will include aspects of how the unique city of Venice is facing urban sustainability and inclusion for its inhabitants within a highly challenging environment.

LOGISTICS

The event will be hosted by the Italian Association for the Council of European Municipalities (AICCRE) in a venue to be confirmed within the island of Venice. AICCRE will cover the costs of meeting room, interpretation, meals and is able to offer a number of hotel rooms to cover accommodation for selected participants.

UNACLA has a very small budget to support the air tickets of participants from developing countries, on a first come, first served basis until the exhaustion of the budget.

The activity has no cost for participants. The participation to this event is by invitation only and will have to be approved by the Secretariat of the event.

Our Italian hosts will also offer a preference fare in selected hotels, as well as recommended itineraries and local support to the event. Assistance to obtain visas can be provided through official letter of invitation by the Italian hosts.

The closest airports to the city of Venice are VCE (Marco Polo) as well as Treviso (TSF) where most low-cost airlines operate. The cities of Bologna, Milan and Rome are also very well connected to Venice by train.
